Speaker Biographies

Kim Boyle '84 is a partner at Phelps Dunbar LLP in New Orleans, practicing in the areas of labor and employment, civil rights, constitutional law, and commercial, tort and general litigation. She is president of the Louisiana State Bar Association and in 2009 was named New Orleans CityBusiness Woman of the Year. She has co-chaired the Committee for a Better New Orleans/Metropolitan Area, is a member of the local advisory board for the United Negro College Fund and was active in rebuilding efforts in New Orleans after Hurricane Katrina. Boyle earned an A.B. in politics from Princeton in 1984 and holds a J.D. from the University of Virginia School of Law. She has served as president of the Princeton Alumni Association of New Orleans and chair of the local Alumni Schools Committee.

Lauren McKenna '07 is a Director at UBS Investment Bank in the Prime Brokerage division and is currently based in London. She graduated from Princeton in 2007 with a degree in Operations Research and Financial Engineering. During her time at Princeton, Lauren was involved with Business Today and TigerCall, and was a member and officer of Kappa Kappa Gamma and Cloister Inn. As an alumna, she is still active in the Princeton Community and serves on the board of the Princeton Alumni Association in the UK, as a co-agent for AG07, as a vice-chair on the National Annual Giving Committee and is on the Aspire executive committee. In her spare time, Lauren also mentors a high school student as a part of Student Sponsor Partners and volunteers with the Junior League in London.

Stanley Katz is President *Emeritus* of the American Council of Learned Societies, the leading organization in humanistic scholarship and education in the United States. Mr. Katz graduated *magna cum laude* from Harvard University in 1955 with a major in English History and Literature. He received his M.A. from Harvard in American History in 1959 and his Ph.D. in the same field from Harvard in 1961. He attended Harvard Law School in 1969-70. Formerly Class of 1921 Bicentennial Professor of the History of American Law and Liberty at Princeton University, Mr. Katz is a leading expert on American legal and constitutional history, and on philanthropy and non-profit institutions. The author and editor of numerous books and articles, Mr. Katz has served as President of the Organization of American Historians and the American Society for Legal History and as Vice President of the Research Division of the American Historical Association. He is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Newberry Library, the Social Science Research Council, the Copyright Clearance Center and numerous other institutions. He also currently serves as Chair of the American Council of Learned Societies/Social Science Research Council Working Group on Cuba.

Pyper Davis '87 is a member and former president of Princeton's class of 1987 who earned an A.B. in East Asian studies. She is chief operating officer of the SEED Foundation, a national nonprofit that establishes and oversees urban public boarding schools to prepare students from underserved communities for success in college and beyond. Davis previously worked as an executive with News Corp. and Katalyst LLC, a boutique consulting and venture capital firm. She holds an MBA from Harvard Business School.
